

PROJECT GUIDELINES

You must turn in 10 **newspaper articles** by the 5th of May. These articles must be from Spanish-speaking countries -- NO EXCEPTIONS! A list of these countries may be found in the front and back covers of your Spanish textbook.

- a. You cannot use magazine articles for this project.
- b. You must glue or tape your articles to typing paper. (70 pts.)
- c. Under each article, list the date and name of the newspaper. You can have more than one article on each page. (20 pts.)
- d. All of your articles must be secured in a folder -- NO EXCEPTIONS! (50 pts.)
- e. You must have a title page for your project. Follow the model below. (25 pts.)
- f. Spanish newspaper articles cannot be used for this project.

Nicaragua disease identified

MANAGUA, Nicaragua

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on Monday tentatively identified a mystery disease that has killed 16 people and infected 2,000 others in Nicaragua.

The agency diagnosed four cases of the disease, known as hemorrhagic fever syndrome, as leptospirosis, Nicaragua's Health Minister Federico Munoz told reporters Monday.

Leptospirosis is an infectious disease transmitted from ani-

mals to humans. It can be treated with penicillin and dicloxacilina.

Humans contract the disease, which has been found in Argentina and several Asian nations, through contact with the urine and fecal matter of dogs, horses, cows, pigs, rodents and other animals.

The disease produces chills, fever, headaches, body aches, and in severe cases bleeding from the lungs, sunken ribs, and accelerated breathing.

■ The front-runner for Guatemala's presidency already had made his victory speech, but election officials said Monday he still may have to compete in a January runoff against a fellow conservative. Early returns gave a majority to Alvaro Arzu, a business magnate and former Guatemala City mayor. But as rural returns came in, he began to fall below 50 percent.

77 killed when plane crashes in Nigeria
LAGOS, Nigeria — A Nigeria Airways plane carrying at least 123 people crashed upon landing Monday in northern Nigeria, and news reports said 77 people were feared dead.
It was one of the worst airline crashes in the history of the West African nation, which already has a poor aviation record.
The plane was flown from the central Nigerian city of Jos to Kaduna, 400 miles northeast of Lagos.

On October 28, 1636, Harvard College was founded in Boston, making it the oldest such institution in the United States; grammar school became compulsory education in Boston. . . . October 25, 1765, the Stamp Act Congress concluded, adopting a Declaration of Rights opposing taxation without representation in Parliament and trial without jury by admiralty courts. . . . October 28, 1776, General Howe failed to destroy George Washington's army at White Plains, N.Y. . . . October 25, 1812, the United States defeated the Macedonian off the Aegea. . . . October 26, 1823, the first boat left Buffalo, bound for New York City on the Erie Canal. . . . October 24, 1861, Pony Express service ended due to the completion of the first transcontinental telegraph line. . . . October 28, 1886, the Statue of Liberty was dedicated in New York Harbor. . . . October 29, 1929, the stock market crashed, marking the end of postwar prosperity as stock prices plunged; it was estimated that stock losses for 1929-1933 were \$50 billion, causing the worst American Depression to date. . . . October 28, 1962, President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Khrushchev reached an agreement on a formula to end the Cuban missile crisis. . . . October 23, 1983, 281 U.S. Marines and sailors, part of the multinational peacekeeping force in Lebanon, were killed when a TNT-filled suicide terrorist blew up the Marine headquarters in Beirut International Airport; at the same time a second truck bomb blew up a French paratrooper barracks two miles away, killing more than 40 people. . . . October 25, 1983, the island of Grenada was invaded by U.S. Marines, Rangers and a small force from six Caribbean nations in response to a request from the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States. . . . October 26, 1994, a peace treaty was signed between Israel and Jordan at a desert site along the Jewish Jordanian border with President Clinton in attendance at the ceremony. . . . October 28, 1994, during a trip to the Middle East, President Clinton visited U.S. troops in Kuwait.
